

Tom and I were in the same outfits at the same time from 1963 to 1967. After that I only saw him a few times but did keep in touch. Tom graduated from the University of Notre Dame. I'm not sure when he went to OCS. We both started Basic School at Quantico, Va. in September of 1963. He finished Basic School in March of 1964 and started flight school in Pensacola, Fl. (we were both in the same basic school class and flight school class).

After receiving his wings in August or September of 1965, he joined HMH-462 in Santa Ana. In May or June of 1966 (I'm not sure when he left-he was already in 362 when I arrived in late June of 66.) he joined HMM 362 in RVN. While with 362 he received a purple heart. When he returned to the States in June or July of 1967, he was assigned to the training command in Pensacola, Fl where he instructed in helicopters for several years.

Upon leaving active duty, he returned to New York City where he worked for Pfizer chemical company as a chemical engineer until his retirement. He passed on April 23, 2009 after a long struggle with cancer. He is survived by his wife Midge and a son (I'm sure about his wife's name and that he had a son, but I don't know if he had any other children.)


Reporting for Duty, Sir!

Col. Archie Clapp Featured in Leatherneck Article By David H. Hugel

I first heard Archie Clapp's name when I arrived in Da Nang as part of Operation Shufly, in April 1963. Anyone stationed there during those early days of the Vietnam War knew that he led the first Marine operational unit, HMM-362, into Soc Trang down in the Mekong Delta, just one year earlier.

It would be many years before I heard his name again. I was riding a commuter train from Northern Virginia into DC every day when a fellow rider showed me an article in June 1999 from the Quantico Sentry featuring Col. Archie J. Clapp, USMC Ret. receiving Sikorsky Aircraft's Life Time Achievement Award.

I knew I had to meet this Marine Corps aviation legend, and through my network of Marine friends arranged meeting him for lunch at a local restaurant in Arlington, Virginia. When we met on the restaurant's parking lot two months later, we shook hands, and as he looked down at my license plate he said, "So you're the one that got the Shufly license plate." Knowing that he was the one responsible for orchestrating Operation Shufly, and who would forever be associated with that word, my first inclination was to apologize to him, but it was a good-natured comment and I resisted the temptation.

We were soon swapping sea stories over lunch about what it was like when I was providing photo coverage of Marine Corps operation in "I" Corps compared with what Archie and his squadron experienced when they were flying missions out of Soc Trang.

Having already written a few articles for Leatherneck magazine, and knowing that the 40th anniversary of that historic operation was coming up in a few years, I decided to write an article commemorating the event. In preparation for the article I interviewed Archie while attending the 2000 Pop A Smoke Reunion in San Diego, but because of commitments at work, I was unable to actually write the article. Instead, I talked with my friend, Leatherneck editor, Walt Ford who agreed to assign one of his writers to do an article, which appeared as planned in Leatherneck's April 2002 issue.

Earlier this year, after I left the US Department of Transportation, Walt and I discussed ideas for stories I might write for Leatherneck over the next several months. Among other ideas, I proposed doing an article on the 50th anniversary of Operation Shufly in 2012; Walt countered by asking me do an article on Archie Clapp's distinguished career as a Marine Corps Aviator.
